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FROM THE ADMINISTRATOR, MR. BRIAN KUIPER

"SUCCESS IN SCHOOL"

As we near the end of summer, and the beginning of a new school year, the question can be raised, "What can be done to ensure that my child is successful in school?" A simple internet search brings up an endless supply of answers. Many of these answers are great ones and have studies and knowledgeable educators to back them up. Yet, these answers rarely if ever get to the root of the issue. They are often humanistic in nature, and thus fail to truly answer the question.

Nevertheless, it serves a good purpose to mention several of these "recipes for success":

Help your child with organization. Homework is more often finished when it can be located. Tests are normally studied for when written in assignment books, and when known to the student and the students' parents.

Agree on a consistent study spot. This is one of the toughest things to do. Most of us agree that the student's bedroom is not the best study spot. It's likely that the kitchen table is not so good either in a four child home. Good thought and knowing your child and her learning style will go a long way towards making this decision.

Know the school system and the teacher. This is a two-way street. As a school system, we encourage teachers to reach out regularly to parents to get to know them. Parents communicating regularly and proactively with teachers is an important part of the process as well. When we know each other during the positive or easy times, we work best with each other during the difficult times.

Know your child's friends. Ideally, that is every classmate. Really, the circle of "good" friends is smaller than that, and students feed off each other. Knowing how and by whom your child is being influenced is valuable for many reasons. This too is a reciprocal relationship. To have good friends, one is called to be a good friend.

Understand reports and report cards. Many reports are sent home throughout the year. In the lower grades, these are sometimes weekly. Take time to look at the packet of papers as that is a telling indicator of real time learning. Hopefully the six or nine week reports tell more than simply a letter grade. These often include sentences or paragraphs referring to growth, and areas that need work. Then, those MAP and DIBELS reports...lots of numbers and graphs. If you don't do so well with that,...

Or if you have any other questions, ask. Please ask questions about things that are unclear. As often as possible, ask them specifically to those who are "in the know". Parents who have gone before you can be helpful, but the best answer is often obtained

by asking school staff. The receptionists who answer the phones, the business manager, the teacher or teacher's aide, the administrator, or the school board member is often best equipped to answer your school related questions. Please don't hesitate to ask.

Humanistic or not, there are some great ideas in that list. However, I think the list can be pared down to a much shorter and more helpful list in our schools. This is due to the very nature of our schools as parental and Christian. I propose the list is as short as these two ideas:

Understand the basis of our schools as parental, and that the whole of this relationship relies on our understanding of the phrase "in the place of the parent". Hopefully, summer provided an opportunity for you to do some reading, as it did for me. Reformed Education by Professor Engelsma is good reading as we prepare for the school year. In this book, he develops well the idea that our school must be parental, and that for a time, the parent gives their authority to the teachers. This means that the teachers and the parents have the responsibility to rear and instruct the student. means that for the day, when the child is at school, they obey teachers as they would obey parents. It means that teachers love and nurture during the day as they would their own child. But, it does not mean that the teacher assumes all of the responsibility. When we know and understand that we work together in this calling, then no party drops the ball in the work that is to be done. For a period of the day, teachers act as parents when they teach, rear, and discipline the children. For a period of the day, parents fulfill their calling as parents when they teach, rear, and discipline the children. Weak means to fulfill His will, but, together, means to fulfill His will. We trust that He will use us together in this instruction. "Trust in the LORD with all thine heart; and lean not unto thine own understanding. In all thy ways acknowledge him, and he shall direct thy paths" (Proverbs 3:5-6). One additional thought here – as we would never speak evil of our spouse, let's commit ourselves, teachers and parents, to not speaking evil of each other.

Pray about school. "Pray one for another...The effectual fervent prayer of a righteous man availeth much" (James 5:16). Pray for the bus driver. Pray for the teacher. Pray for the teacher's aide, office secretary, librarian, custodian, and coach. Pray for the administrator and the school Board. But, most importantly, as you pray with your children, pray for your children. Pray that God will bless the work of the school, that He will grant safety and health, that He will increase each child in love and learning, and that He will be praised by this work. God's answer to prayer is always clear. His answer is that His will will be done, and that when we trust in Him, we will be successful!

FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT ~ MR. JARED DYKSTRA

As we start another school year, the Finance Committee has reviewed the tuition from the past year. As a committee, we have been reminded again of the commitment that each family at Heritage makes when they promise to see to it that their children are instructed in the truths of the Scriptures. They are not only making a commitment to the time and effort it takes to instruct these children, but to the great financial commitment which tuition places on each of these families.

The Board is happy to report that the 2017-2018 fiscal year ended with a surplus of \$57,217. This has enabled us to pay off the remaining mortgage balance that we had and allows us to start setting money aside for the new expansion.

This past May, the Society approved a budget for the school. The budgeted expense for the upcoming school year is \$2,708,375 with tuition accounting for just over \$2,211,375 of these expenses. The remaining funds must come from drives, church collections, fundraisers, Foundation, and other gifts. The new budget has a Fall drive of \$152,500, and a Spring drive of \$152,500. In this past year we were blessed to have exceeded these budgeted amounts

for the annual drives!! The fundraisers have again donated over \$70,000 to the budget which helps keep our tuition down while also having made large donations for items such as the fire suppression system which needed to be repaired last summer. We cannot thank the ladies that run the fundraisers and the fair enough. At the society meeting we also approved and began a new expansion for the school and capital campaign. While this expansion is currently underway we would like to remind everyone of the \$750,000 capital campaign that is in process and request that you prayerfully consider this need. The goal of this campaign is to keep our mortgage balance to a minimum and to not have to increase tuition any more than necessary.

The Finance committee would like to especially thank those who do not have children at HCS, but who willingly give at the time of the drives and to the collections. Without the success of these drives, fundraisers, and collections, the tuition for each family would be much higher. We ask for your continued support for the coming school year and that you continue to give as God has blessed you.

ENROLLMENT COMMITTEE REPORT ~ MR. BOB DRNEK

The Enrollment Committee met this past June with each of the new families that will be sending their children to Heritage Christian School for the first time. During these meetings with each family we went over our mission statement, our basis of beliefs, and we had the opportunity to explain how the school operates on a daily basis. Heritage would arrange and cover the cost of any licensing requirements.

There were two minor items of note during the state bus inspections this summer. These are being repaired so all of the busses will be ready for service when school starts.

There were occasional occurrences of student misbehavior noted in the past school year. Please take the time to remind your children to obey the rules and respect the authority of the drivers, so they can give their full attention to the safe, timely transportation of students to and from school. Please also remind your children of their calling to be lights in this world, giving witness of their faith through godly behavior. If we all pay attention to these items, it will promote a safe, efficient, and pleasant commute for everyone. If you do have concerns about behavior please contact the driver to discuss this. If the concerns do not get resolved, please contact Jessica Vander Kolk and/or a member of the Transportation Committee.

BUSING INFORMATION

Bus routes will be emailed out as soon as they are completed. We are still juggling routes because we are STILL looking for an afternoon driver!

Those who are planning to ride Heritage buses, please read the following information: 1) Please mark your houses and mailboxes clearly so that our drivers can find your houses easily. 2) Parents are asked to have their children at the bus stop 5 minutes before their scheduled time. At times students wait in cars at the bus stop. Please make sure your kids are out of the car and ready to board the bus before it stops instead of waiting until the

bus is stopped to exit your cars. Time is vital to keeping the bus routes on schedule. 3) The Holland bus students will be picked up in the bus driveway at approximately 3:03 in the afternoon. 4) The first family on each HCS bus route will be notified when the bus will not run, or will be late due to bad weather or a breakdown. It is important that each family then call the next family on the list. If the next family in line cannot be reached in person, please leave a message, then call the following family on the route so that the calls will continue through to the last person on the list. Don't stop calling until you speak to a live person, please!

BUS RULES ADOPTED BY THE BOARD

- Instruct your children what they should do if you are not at home when they get dropped off the bus. Tell them about a spare key, a neighbor to go to or the like.
- 2. No eating or drinking on the buses.
- Noise must be kept to a minimum and children must remain seated during the running of the bus.
- 4. If windows are open, nothing may be thrown out, and no part of the body extended out windows.
- 5. Anyone destroying bus property will be responsible for repairs.
- Proper, Godly behavior is the utmost importance and must always be emphasized to our children.
 We must remember that if students misbehave and distract the driver, they endanger everyone on the bus.

Public Bus Riders

Hudsonville Transportation will be mailing out post cards with bus routes this year to everyone but families that have only a kindergartener attending (those families will receive an email from the bus barn). Postcards will be mailed the week of the fair. If you don't see a postcard by Friday, August 24, please email or call school. If no one answers, we will help on Monday the 28th.

Remember that there is NO public busing the first day of school.

Attention students planning to ride the bus to Covenant Christian High School: WE NEED YOUR FORMS ASAP – no later than August 17!!!!! Please be ready to board the bus in the circle drive of Heritage BY 7:47 AM. At the conclusion of the school day, the bus will arrive back at Heritage at approximately 3:03 PM.

HERITAGE CHRISTIAN STUDENT DRESS CODE POLICY

The dress code policy of Heritage Christian School follows. Please review it in order to answer any questions which you may have regarding appropriate dress for school days.

The parents have the primary responsibility for the clothing their children wear to school. We are confident that parents desire to exercise proper judgment in this regard. Because there are occasions when the school and the parents may differ on what is proper and appropriate clothing, Heritage Christian School reserves the right to decide on what is proper and fitting for school wear in accordance with Heritage Christian School policy.

For all the students in grades 6-8, clothing must be modest, and clean. While young children may wear sleeveless blouses or shirts, all students in grades 6-8 will wear blouses or shirts with sleeves. Top garments must be shoulder covering, i.e. no tank tops or straps over the shoulder; bottom garments must be at least mid-thigh length. Bare midriffs and backs, low necklines,

and exposed undergarments are not acceptable in any position, i.e. reaching down, stretching, etc. All clothing which is made of sheer material, or which is suggestive, offensive, or advertises alcohol, tobacco, or other "inappropriate-for-school" messages, is prohibited. Hats are not to be worn in school except on specified days; footwear is to be worn at all times during the school day. No forms of sandals may be worn for indoor or outdoor gym classes or for intramurals, due to practical and safety concerns.

At any time during the school year, the principal, in consultation with the staff, may prohibit any grooming practice, article of clothing, accessories, emblems and logos, if they are deemed to be a safety concern or a distraction.

Students who choose to violate this policy may be asked to change their clothing or be held out of class. Parents will be notified by the classroom teacher if there is a lack of cooperation on the part of the students.

The 4th annual Peer To Peer walk for the support of our Protestant Reformed Special Education Society (PRSE) will be held this September 22nd. Think of this as the PRSE's family fun night or fall supper but with donuts for breakfast! On more than one occasion in recent months, members of the committee have been asked; "How did the event start?" So I thought I'd take this opportunity to share that with you.



Beginning of the year information:

- School starts on <u>MONDAY</u>, <u>August 27</u> at 7:52 AM. We will see you then, D.V.
- There <u>WILL NOT</u> be public school busing on the first day! It begins on Tuesday, 8/28.
- On the first morning of school, all staff will be outside to assist students to the correct doors.
- Parents who drop off and pick up children please follow procedures for morning and afternoon!
 Please read the following notes carefully so that you fully understand the procedures for drivers in the school parking lot. If you are reading this but your spouse drops off the children, PLEASE make sure that they read it or read it to them!! These guidelines apply each and every day of the school year. THANKS!


THIS IS the **Morning Procedure**:

- If you have students in K-8, use WEST parking lot —Drive south, make a U-turn, & pull ahead as far as possible and drop off ALL students. (see diagram below).
- **IF you have students ONLY in 5-8, use NORTH** parking lot Enter the 3rd (center) driving lane and pull up to the sidewalk in front of the gym entrance (see diagram below).
- **BOTH LOTS:** Have your children quickly exit your vehicle on the **passenger side** and go directly to the sidewalk. Your children can then walk on the sidewalk to their designated door. You DO NOT have to wait to be first in line to let your children exit your vehicle, but you do need to be by the sidewalk. You will then exit the parking lot either through the west drive to Balsam or through the north drive to Port Sheldon.
- If you have business in school, first drop off your students and then park in one of the parking spots in the north parking lot (by the main doors).
- **DO NOT PARK** in the **WEST** parking lot before 8:15.
- DO NOT ENTER the bus drive at any time.



THIS IS the <u>Afternoon Procedure:</u>

- For families with students in K-8: Please back into a marked spot on either side of the WEST parking lot. School personnel will help children cross and find rides.
- If you ONLY have students in 5-8: Please pull into a parking spot on the east side of the NORTH parking lot facing out (see diagram). After 2:30, there will be no driving in the open area between as this will be the walking area. Students will approach cars from the rear and once you have your students, you can exit by using the outside driving lanes. If you arrive later than 2:30, please DO NOT drive in the student walking area. You will need to back into a spot when you can safely do so.
- If you only pick up occasionally, i.e. if there is no public busing, please use the NORTH parking lot. If all spots in the designated area are taken, back into a spot on the far east leaving enough room for students to walk behind your car. NO students may walk in the designated driving area.
- Students who are walking to the car in either lot are instructed to walk ONLY on the sidewalk or a designated area in or around the parking lot. If they need to cross the parking lot, they may cross when the monitor tells them it is safe to cross.
- Parents are asked to show by example and only use the crosswalk and the sidewalk.



Other general information:

- Students are <u>not</u> to take I-Pods, MP3 players, or any other listening devices to school. Cell phone use and display
 by students is also not permitted during school hours.
- Immunization Records are required for all students entering 7th grade, all kindergarteners and all students new to Heritage. Kindergarten health appraisal forms and vision screening certificates are due in the office by the first day of school, August 27. You may drop them off, mail or fax (616-669-4257) them to the office. Any questions, please call the office (669-1773). Thanks!
- Volunteer scheduling will take place later in September. Thank you to those of you who signed up to volunteer!

From the Health Department:

- Kitchen help must wear a baseball cap, or we will provide a hairnet
- Food from home may not be stored in the restaurant kitchen. If you wish to bring in food for your break, please keep in your vehicle until break time.

Dress code and suggestions from the committee:

- Expect your clothing to get dirty, particularly if you are working in the kitchen.
- Neat, modest, clothing is always appropriate. Wear comfortable tennis shoes.
- Shorts are permitted by the Health Department, and suggested by the committee, since it is usually hot in the building.

Other important things to note:

- Children are not allowed to accompany parents to their shift at the restaurant or the food prep day. We could be shut down by the Health Department if this rule is not followed.
- If you are working in the kitchen, expect to wear gloves for most of your shift. We will provide latex-free gloves in two sizes.
- You will have a short break on your shift, and may order from our kitchen at half price.
- Per the Hudsonville Fair Board, our volunteers are required to pay the regular gate admission fee of \$3. Please consider this a donation to our school. If this is a hardship, contact a committee member during your shift for reimbursement.
- Have fun! Be cheerful! Remember, we will be representing Heritage Christian School to many people this week!
