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FROM THE ADMINISTRATOR, MR. BRIAN KUIPER

"But grow in grace, and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. To him be glory both now and for ever. Amen." II Peter 3:18

"ARE YOU GROWING?"

Son a new school year will begin! The passage quoted will be the school text for the year as chosen by the 8th grade class scheduled to graduate in May, 2025. As we prepare, it is good to reflect upon goals, missions, and purposes of Christian education. When we do so, we understand that there are academic goals, social goals, and spiritual goals that teachers and parents have for the students each year. And, there is one uniting theme to all of these goals. Growth. Goals are always made with the intention of having to make progress towards a target. Certain goals - weight loss, behavior modification - are intended to be achieved by means of regression. However, most goals are progressive in nature. *All* goals require work and effort and dedication to meet the task and goal at hand.

The passage speaks of growing. We know that this word refers to an action that can be measured over time and really reaches no end. When a plant or animal grows, one can measure growth using universally acceptable standards. Measuring academic growth can be done by comparing to recognized standards also. Tests, quizzes, standardized tests, and other means can be used to measure progress in learning. Spiritual growth can be measured based on the depth of answers and scriptural support to prompts that a student is given. Social growth becomes a bit more subjective. Yet, in all cases, growth can be seen and measured over time.

The passage calls us to grow in grace and in knowledge. Those words tie together the idea of spiritual and academic goals. Grace is shown by those who are a good friend. Grace is shown when forgiving and seeking forgiveness. Grace is the kindness shown to all in word and deed. Knowledge has to do with the acquiring of facts and information. Knowledge can be gained through reading, simple conversations, or dedicated and intentional teaching. Once again, growth in grace and knowledge is measurable and can be seen.

The passage calls us to make this growth for one specific purpose. To the glory of Him! While our human nature and school assessment methods are sometimes comparable in nature, they almost always May we be sure to come together this year to glorify our Maker!

Finally, parents, students, teachers, staff, supporters, hear from the Apostle Paul in another text. In I Timothy 4:15, he writes "Meditate upon these things; give thyself wholly to them; that thy profiting may appear to all". He is writing to Timothy and exhorting

compare students to an objective standard. Occasionally, our pride directs the glory to self. However, the standard here is clear. Use grace, knowledge, and growth to point to Him. him to attend to "reading, to exhortation, to doctrine" (v13). Doing these things will help Timothy grow in grace and knowledge. As we come together for these good goals and purposes, may we do so with energy, passion, and dedication that shows that we are giving ourselves "wholly" to them!

FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT ~ MR. BLAKE WIERINGA

The Finance Committee just finished a busy stretch of time and transition. The committee worked diligently the month of June to collect all outstanding tuition, and then to finalize the school's June 30, 2024 fiscal yearend financial statements during the month of July. The committee reported an ~\$140k loss to the school board for this past fiscal year, and the Society will receive a full report on this past fiscal year at its next society meeting in April 2025. The loss is large and depleted some of the school's cash reserves, but God has blessed Heritage Christian School over the years with surpluses, and we remain in a financially strong cash position with no outstanding debt. I will also add that this loss did not come as a recent surprise, and the loss amount was anticipated already over 12 months ago when we unexpectedly lost 11 families and 25 students during the 2023 enrollment period last summer. The families that left amounted to ~\$123k of lost budgeted tuition revenue. In addition to the loss of tuition revenue, the school collected ~\$401k for its combined fall and spring deficit drive amounts which was under its budgeted goal of \$420k. The finance committee is pleased to report that the school came in under budget for expenses the past fiscal year.

While we've recently closed the past school year, we now enter into a new fiscal year. This past April, the Society unanimously approved a budget for the 2024-25 school year. The budgeted expenses for the upcoming school year are approximately \$3,234,000 (or a ~3% increase from the previous year). expense increase is predominantly driven by increased wages for the school's faculty. The school's budgeted tuition for the upcoming year is approximately \$2,395,000 (or ~74% of the budgeted expenses). The remaining budgeted funds must come from drives. church collections, fundraisers, the HCS Foundation, and other gifts. Please prayerfully consider the needs of HCS as we begin a new school year in just a few short weeks, and please make special note that the '24-'25 budget includes society-approved budgeted amounts of \$250,000 for the fall drive and \$250,000 for the spring drive.

The HCS board would like to thank all of its supporters and tuition paying families who graciously give to the drives and to the church collections. We are also grateful to those who give and do not have children at HCS; I cannot underscore the importance of giving through these causes as it allows the finance committee and board to keep the tuition load lighter on tuition-paying families. Finally, we also say thanks to all of those who were a part of Boosters, Fundraisers, the Foundation, and many other committees that help raise funds for the school. These fundraising efforts are also enormously helpful in keeping our tuition costs down as much as possible.

As I mentioned at the opening of my report, we did also have some recent transition within our committee. The Finance Committee would like to thank retiring board members Tyler Schimmel and Keith Feenstra for their hard work on FC the last three years. We also welcomed newly elected board members Jason Butler and John Pipe to our committee. The school's new Finance Committee for the upcoming school year is Jared Dykstra, Jason Butler, John Pipe, and myself.

Finally, remember to come out, bring some friends/family, and support our HCS restaurant and grand stand booth at the Hudsonville Fair during the week of August 19-24! This has become the school's largest fundraiser, and if you can't volunteer with time you certainly can help support by taking your family for a dinner (or two) out at the fair, schedule your business and lunch meetings, or consider being a business sponsor (please contact Amy Horvat for sponsor opportunities for next year's fair fundraiser at 616-260-3502). We appreciate the Fair Committee for all the hard work that goes into this!

the same as they do for classroom teachers. Once again, please be reminded that the use of electronic devices, including phones and tablets, is not allowed on our buses.

BUSING INFORMATION

Those who are planning to ride Heritage buses, please read the following information:

- Remember that the morning pick up times may be adjusted in the first couple of weeks of school. The corrected times (if there are any) will be published in the school directory.
- Please mark your houses and mailboxes clearly so that our drivers can find your houses easily.
- Parents are asked to have their children at the bus stop 5 minutes before their scheduled time. At times students wait in cars at the bus stop. Please make sure your kids are out of the car and ready to board the bus before it stops instead of waiting until the bus is stopped to exit your cars. Time is vital to keeping the bus routes on schedule. If you are not visible, the driver will not be able to wait.
- Make sure parents are at group stops and visible to drivers in the afternoon unless the driver is otherwise notified. If the driver does not see the parents, the children will not be let off and parents will be notified by the school where they may pick up their children.
- Other riders, we appreciate it if the garage door is left open, so we know that you are home. If you feel comfortable letting your children off the bus without that, please notify your driver.
- There are to be no electronics on the buses.
 This goes for high school riders as well. Any

- devices that are seen will be confiscated and may be picked up by a parent in the office
- Safety matters: Please have your children stand back at least 10 feet from the road for their safety. Do not approach the bus until the doors are open.
- Please text/call your driver if your children are not riding.
- Please communicate with your driver or the supervisor if you are having any issues.
- Students may not ride a different bus without previous approval from the driver. Driver numbers are found below, and will also be posted in the directory.
- Due to safety reasons, students may not take instruments larger than what can fit on their lap onto the bus.
- Families on HCS bus routes will be notified via email and/or text message when the bus will not run, or will be late due to bad weather or a breakdown.

CCHS SHUTTLE BUS RIDERS:

- The CCHS shuttle bus leaves at 7:40 sharp, it will not wait for riders. Please be waiting by the bus drive for the bus.
- There will be a sign-in sheet for non-regular Covenant riders, and the parents will be billed at the end of the month.

BUS RULES ADOPTED BY THE BOARD

- Instruct your children what they should do if you are not at home when they get dropped off the bus. Tell them about a spare key, a neighbor to go to, or the like.
- 2. No eating or drinking on the buses. Noise must be kept to a minimum and children must remain seated during the running of the bus.
- 3. If windows are open, nothing may be thrown out, and no part of the body extended out windows.
- Anyone destroying bus property will be responsible for repairs.
- Proper, Godly behavior is the utmost importance and must always be emphasized to our children. We must remember that if students misbehave and distract the driver, they endanger everyone on the bus.

HERITAGE CHRISTIAN STUDENT DRESS CODE POLICY

The dress code policy of Heritage Christian School follows. Please review it in order to answer any questions which you may have regarding appropriate dress for school days.

The parents have the primary responsibility for the clothing their children wear to school. We are confident that parents desire to exercise proper judgment in this regard. Because there are occasions when the school

and the parents may differ on what is proper and appropriate clothing, Heritage Christian School reserves the right to decide on what is proper and fitting for school wear in accordance with Heritage Christian School policy.

An <u>addition to the Dress Code Policy</u> includes the following: "Leggings and yoga pants are not considered pants and must be covered with a top that is at least

mid-thigh or fingertip length all the way around." This will be included in the school directory's policy section as well.

For all the students in grades 6-8, clothing must be modest, and clean. While young children may wear sleeveless blouses or shirts, all students in grades 6-8 will wear blouses or shirts with sleeves. Top garments must be shoulder covering, i.e. no tank tops or straps over the shoulder; bottom garments must be at least mid-thigh length. Ensure that all pants are modest and rips are not above the knees. Leggings and yoga pants are not considered pants and must be covered with a top that is at least mid-thigh or fingertip length all the way around. Bare midriffs and backs, low necklines, and exposed undergarments are not acceptable in any position, i.e. reaching down, stretching, etc. All clothing which is made of sheer material, or which is suggestive,

offensive, or advertises alcohol, tobacco, or other "inappropriate-for-school" messages, is prohibited. Hats are not to be worn in school except on specified days; footwear is to be worn at all times during the school day. No forms of sandals may be worn for indoor or outdoor gym classes or for intramurals, due to practical and safety concerns.

At any time during the school year, the principal, in consultation with the staff, may prohibit any grooming practice, article of clothing, accessories, emblems and logos, if they are deemed to be a safety concern or a distraction.

Students who choose to violate this policy may be asked to change their clothing or be held out of class. Parents will be notified by the classroom teacher if there is a lack of cooperation on the part of the students.


Beginning of the year information:

- School starts on <u>TUESDAY, August 27</u> at 7:52 AM. On <u>MONDAY, August 26</u> we will be having an Open House from 9 until Noon. Feel free to bring those big bags of school supplies for the desks and lockers on this morning. We will see you then, D.V.
- There WILL be public school busing on the first day!
- HCS staff will not dispense non-prescription medications to students. This is because we are not the
 best judge of your child's health concerns. Additionally, over-medicating could occur in instances where
 a child had medication at home or from their backpack and did not tell us. Parents who know their child
 has chronic pain issues (headache, joint ache, ...) should provide a single dose of medication in their
 child's backpack and monitor usage by being in regular communication with their child.
- Volunteer Program: If you are interested in volunteering to help with our precious covenant children, we
 would love to hear from you! There are opportunities to help with various things. You can volunteer to
 help once a week, every other week, or once a month. Email Wilma at receptionistwest@hchr.org if
 interested.
- Students are not to take I-Pods, MP3 players, or any other listening devices to school. Cell phone use and display by students is also not permitted without permission during school hours in the building or on the buses.
- Immunization Records are required for all students entering 7th grade, all kindergarteners and all students new to Heritage. Kindergarten health appraisal forms and vision screening certificates are due in the office by the first day of school, August 28. If you sent them in already, thank you! If not, you may drop them off, mail them, or email them to the office. Any questions, please call the office (669-1773). Thanks!
- Thank you: The staff of Heritage Christian School would like to thank all the Board members, Fundraisers, volunteers, bus drivers, and anyone else who has a part in making the school run so smoothly. We look forward to another year of working together!
- Parents who drop off and pick up children for the safety of our children, please follow procedures for morning and afternoon! Read the following notes carefully so that you fully understand the procedures for drivers in the school parking lot. If you are reading this but your spouse drops off the children, PLEASE make sure that they read it or read it to them!! These guidelines apply each and every day of the school year. It appears to be confusing, so if you have questions please ask someone at school! THANKS!

Morning Procedure

- If you have students in K-8, use the WEST parking lot —Drive south, make a U-turn at the far end of the lot, & then pull ahead towards the entrance doors as far as possible and drop off ALL students. (see diagram below).
- **IF you have students ONLY in 5-8, use NORTH** parking lot Enter the 3rd (center) driving lane and pull up to the sidewalk in front of the gym entrance (see diagram below).
- **BOTH LOTS:** Have your children quickly exit your vehicle on the **passenger side** and go directly to the sidewalk. Your children can then walk on the sidewalk to their designated door. You DO NOT have to wait to be first in line to let your children exit your vehicle, but you do need to be by the sidewalk. You will then exit the parking lot either through the west drive to Balsam or through the north drive to Port Sheldon. We are not allowed to exit through the apartment lot to the north of school.
- If you have business in school, first drop off your students and then park in one of the parking spots in the north parking lot (by the main doors).
- DO NOT PARK in the WEST parking lot before 8:15.
- DO NOT ENTER the bus drive at any time.


Morning Procedure diagram:



Afternoon Procedure

- For families with students in K-8: Please back into a marked spot on either side of the WEST parking lot. School personnel will help children cross and find rides.
- If you ONLY have students in 5-8: Please pull into a parking spot on the east side of the NORTH parking lot facing out (see diagram). After 2:30, there will be no driving in the open area between as this will be the walking area. Students will approach cars from the rear and once you have your students, you can exit by using the outside driving lanes. If you arrive later than 2:30, please DO NOT drive in the student walking area. You will need to back into a spot when you can safely do so.
- If you only pick up occasionally, i.e. if there is no public busing, please use the NORTH parking lot. If all spots in the designated area are taken, back into a spot on the far east end, leaving enough room for students to walk behind your car. NO students may walk in the designated driving area.
- Students who are walking to the car in either lot are instructed to walk ONLY on the sidewalk or a designated area in or around the parking lot. If they need to cross the parking lot, they may cross when the monitor tells them it is safe to cross.
- Parents are asked to show by example and only use the crosswalk and the sidewalk.
- If you do not have a handicapped plate, you are not allowed to use the handicapped parking spaces.

Kindergarten Parents, please take note!

The schedule for the first two weeks of school will be as follows:

- Tuesday, August 27: Kindergarten Roundup (8:30 -10:30 AM) for KB class and one of their parents.
- Wednesday, August 28: Kindergarten Roundup (8:30 -10:30 AM) for KA and KC classes and one of their parents.
- Thursday, August 29: KB class (half day 7:52 11:30 AM)
- Friday, August 30 Monday, September 3: Labor Day break (no school)
- Tuesday, September 3: KB class (full day)
- Wednesday, September 4: KA and KC classes (full day)
- Thursday, September 5: KB class (full day)
- Friday, September 6: KA and KC classes (full day) **Note only two classes, to keep days somewhat even for the first two weeks of school.

Normal schedule begins on Monday, September 9.

Please remember to continue to be courteous to all the neighbors around our campus! This includes refraining from using neighboring business parking lots as shortcuts to leave or arrive more quickly.

HEALTH DEPT REQUIREMENTS
